Every part in Ireland astonished me. The fact it was so green and naturistic enlightened me throughout my experience abroad. It was also my first time seeing a sky full of stars during the night; a truly mystic sight. Apart from Ireland, I visited a few places like London, Germany, Brussels and a couple more others! All the places I traveled to around Europe was worthwhile. I think every place I visited was community friendly, the different cultural foods I had was out of this world!

I'm thinking about going to grad school abroad hopefully. There's just something about Europe that you can't receive in America. It's different and being a foreigner is also cool.
