For each course, the examination is offered twice . The first examination period extends over three weeks while the second lasts one week only. Be aware that no more than two examinations can be taken in the second exam period (resit) and you can only take them if you failed the first exam or you missed it. Only note that the evaluation method in the second assessment may not take in consideration the previous work developed during the semester – it will worth 100% (each student must contact the Professor of the course to clarify this issue). Students must enrol online.					
Improvi	ng a Grade – Underg	raduate Courses			
If necessary, students are allowed to improve a grade. This is limited to one grade improvement exam per semester. There is no possibility to enrol in a course for a second time, once a student obtains the credits of a course, by obtaining a grade of at least 10. The student must keep the grade obtained in the course, which will be recorded on the Transcript of Records unless there is a grade review by the faculty. Students must enrol for the exam at the Bursary Office 4 days prior to the exam date, and pay the enrolment fee (15 \in).					
Grading scale We use a 0-20 scale to grade students, following the Portuguese convention. The top grade, 20 points, distinguishes an outstanding performance and is very rarely awarded. The bottom grade, 0 points, is awarded only to absolutely disastrous performances. Note also that the fail range is from 0 to 9; hence, 10 points is the threshold to pass. You can compare our scale with the ECTS grading scale in Table 1. Table 1: Grading scales at Nova SBE



Students' Nominations:	Incoming students' nominations must be done directly by the home university with which an Exchange agreement has been signed. The nominations should be addressed by email to <u>exchangestudents@novasbe.pt</u> till May 15th for the Fall semester and whole academic year and by October 15th for the Spring semester .
Accommodation:	There is an active market in Lisbon for rental housing where most foreign students can find a nice place to stay. The International Office provides assistance to help foreign students finding a suitable accommodation upon arrival in Lisbon. Contact exchangestudents@novasbe.pt for more information.



Living Expenses:	 Students' expenses in Lisbon will naturally depend on their living situation and on their own spending habits. We provide, however, an approximate estimate for an average student below: Accommodation: 350€ - 450€/month Meals: 150€ - 200€/month Books/Supplies: 50€/month Transportation (bus, train, metro): 37-43€/month Leisure: 75€ - 100€/month
Health insurance:	In order to have access to public health care, E.U. citizens, who are not residents in Portugal, must bring their European Health Insurance Cards issued by their home countries. Other students are strongly recommended to have a health insurance covering the whole period in Lisbon.
Facilities:	Library / documentation centres, computer facilities (including e-mail connections for all exchange students) and wireless internet access throughout the main building, Catering Facilities (bars, canteen), dedicated Study Rooms to Masters Students are available. Several student's organisations and clubs are also open to Exchange Students.
